

In 2006, police officer Darlene Crider, assigned to the Neighborhood Services Unit—Eastern District Baltimore City Police Department, was requested to develop some type of outreach to help young girls in East Baltimore. Officer Darlene Crider along with Officer Karen Long, developed the program “Young Girls to Young Ladies”.

For three years, this mentoring initiative was a success, resulting in many participants turning their lives around, attending and graduating college, steady employment and careers in the work world and military. After Officer Crider’s retirement the program faded into obscurity.

In 2011, Darlene had a desire for the program to re-emerge, however obstacles were encountered which prevented its implementation. Finally, in 2012 an opportunity presented itself for the mentoring program to have a fresh start with a new name: Sisters-In-Law, a mentoring group comprised of retired female police officers mentoring young girls ages 9 and above.

Purpose

The purpose of Sisters-In-Law is to mentor young girls ages 9 and above.

Sisters-In-Law is comprised of retired female law enforcement officers who are committed to “give back” after serving their communities over the years in the capacity of providing service to all citizens.

Vision

Sisters-In-Law is a mentoring group where young girls ages 9 and above are inspired to reach their maximum potential by setting goals, making positive decisions, increasing academic achievements and becoming responsible young ladies in an ever-changing society. Utilizing the resources of professional organizations, churches, businesses, municipal agencies, corporations and public officials will enhance the participants involved to become caring, respectable and responsible citizens.
